Aim and Strategy

To provide a total return (income and capital growth) after costs and before tax, above the MSCI All Country World Index (net dividends reinvested) on a rolling five -year basis. The portfolio may also invest a portion of its assets in emerging markets. In certain market conditions, the portfolio may hold a higher level of cash (see additional information about Responsible Investment Leaders for more information).

Fund Performance

The Fund posted a strong absolute return and outperformed slightly in the September quarter (before fees). At the manager level, Lazard and C Worldwide outperformed their respective benchmarks whilst Boston Partners underperformed. The holding in the Ethical Leaders Emerging Markets Fund also outperformed the emerging markets benchmark. Stock selection was the key positive contributor to the Fund's relative return. An overweight to Sony Corporation in Japan was the prime contributor from an individual company perspective. Sony's share price rose after announcing quarterly results that beat the market consensus. The sell-side subsequently turned more positive on the company outlook due to its growing movie and music business and its exposure to the iPhone camera upgrades. An overweight to emerging markets was a detractor, as the sector was outperformed by developed markets over the quarter. Positive stock selection however more than offset the drag from the overweight emerging markets exposure.

Environmental Social Governance

Boston Partners engaged with a Brazilian airline company about carbon offsetting, cybersecurity and supplier due diligence process. The airline company discussed its energy usage, GHG emissions and waste, noting the primary source of these is flights rather than office operations. The company has also been improving fuel efficiency by modernising its fleet.

C Worldwide is actively engaging with Nestlé regarding child labour in the cocoa industry. For more than ten years, the cocoa industry has been criticised for its association with child labour in its supply chain, especially in Ghana and Ivory Coast.

In terms of corporate governance, company disclosure and board composition were a focus during the quarter, having been raised by Investec in number of company meetings. Also, following on from a prior request (to a Luxembourg-listed materials company) for better disclosure and transparency through a global reporting standard/framework, we have seen some progress and the company is now preparing their data for this.

In Developed Markets, Boston Partners continued to raise concerns about "overboarding", with several companies, stressing the need for boards to ensure they are made up of directors who are not overburdened and can perform their given duties effectively.

Market Review

International shares climbed higher in the September quarter, with the MSCI World ex Australia index rising by 1.50% over the period. Markets started the quarter positively amid generally good US corporate earnings and hopes of a favourable US-China outcome. A pull-back then occurred in August and some volatility emerged as speculation rose in regard to the sustainability of global (and particularly US) growth. Mixed messages on monetary policy from the Fed also didn't help. Global markets then recovered to higher levels in September amid continued volatility. Drivers included central bank interest rate reductions and commentary (as the US Federal Reserve reduced the Federal Funds Rate range by a further 25 basis points to 1.75-2.0%), the drone strike in Saudi Arabia by Iranian-backed Houthi rebels, as well as some small but positive US-China trade developments. With the aforementioned drivers, the US S&P 500 index finished the quarter up by 1.70%, the Japanese TOPIX 100 index finished up by 3.39% amid suggestions of further monetary stimulus and the European STOXX 50 index (+2.47%) rose in the wake of new stimulus measures being announced by the European Central Bank. Emerging markets however struggled during the quarter and underperformed their developed-market counterparts, with the MSCI Emerging Markets accumulation index finishing down by 2.07%. Geopolitical volatility, trade war fears and sovereign debt issues were all contributing factors. (All indices quoted in local currency terms and on a total-return basis, unless otherwise stated.)

Outlook

Global share markets remain at risk of further weakness in the months ahead on the back of the ongoing US-China trade dispute, Middle East tensions, and mixed economic data as we are in a seasonally weak part of the year for shares.

However, valuations are reasonable, particularly when compared against low bond yields. Global growth indicators are expected to improve by next year and monetary and fiscal policy are becoming more supportive, all of which should support decent gains for share markets on a 6-12 month horizon.

During the current turbulent period, quality companies with solid defensive properties may present the best opportunities for risk-adjusted returns.
